#### DD Lab Receives \$3 Million for Down Syndrome Research

Thanks to the dedication of committed research participants, our lab has received funding to continue learning about thinking skills in people with Down syndrome. Some of this funding comes from <u>DS INCLUDE</u>, a funding project sponsored by the National Institutes of Health (NIH), which specifically focuses on learning more about Down syndrome. DS INCLUDE has increased funding for Down syndrome research to ~ \$77 million per year.

#### Executive Functioning Outcomes Study

We are studying the best ways to measure Executive Function in children with Down syndrome. 'Executive Function' skills are the thinking skills we use for problem solving and planning. **Ages:** 2.5 to 7 years old **Compensation:** Up to \$200 **# of Visits:** 4

### **Infant-Follow Up Study**

Over the last 5 years, our team visited 76 infants with Down syndrome across the country. We are excited to be following up with all these infants over the next 2 years to answer more questions about early development in children with Down syndrome!
